Appealing an NDIA Decision Through the AAT

'AAT' means Administrative Appeals Tribunal.

'NDIA' means the National Disability Insurance Agency. They run the 'NDIS' National Disability Insurance Scheme. (Tip: Remember that 'A' comes before 'S' in the alphabet. NDIA runs the NDIS.

Reviews

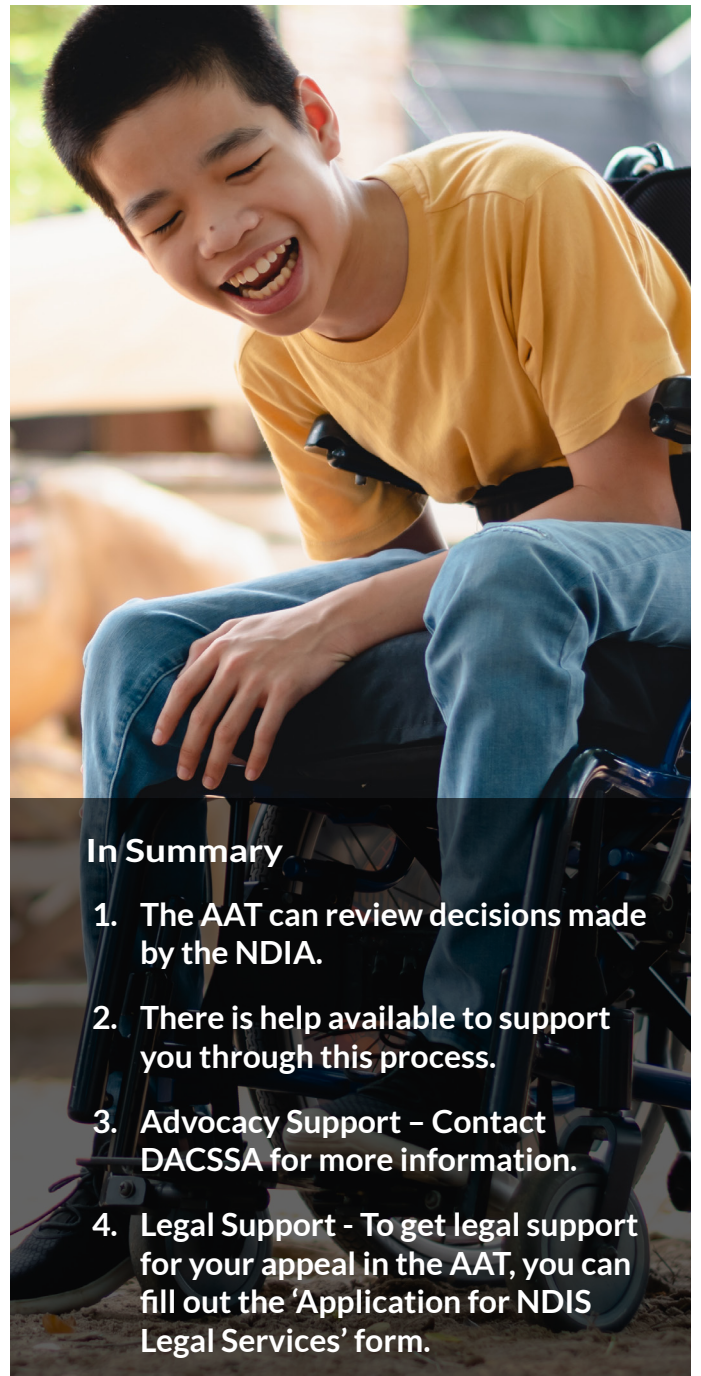
If you're unhappy with a decision the NDIA makes you may request a review.

NDIS has a piece of legislation called the NDIS Act 2013. In this act it tells you you're allowed to appeal a decision in the Administrative Appeals Tribunal.

There are different types of reviews – today we're talking about the Administrative Appeals Tribunal.

Tips for NDIS Forms

- Keep copies of letters you get from the NDIA
- Be clear about why you disagree with the decision
- Consider your lived experience of disability and make sure they understand information about your life
- Be clear about your goal outcomes and what you want
